Nor do I see any reason that the e should not be short in this word as well as in plenitude .-- Walker. We have Walker, Worcester, and seven other orthoepists for the first marking; Smart, Webster, and three others for the second. plenipotentiary--pleu-i-po-tenshi-a-re. pl8tho-ra. ple-thoric, or pletho-ric. The early editions of Websters dictionary said pletho-ric, and the later editions permit this pronunciation. All the English orthoepists, except Ash and Crabb, accent the second syllable. plume, not plum. See adduce. poem, not pom. poignant--poinant. po-lice, See opinion. polonaise not po-. (Fr.)--polo-naz, not po-. polyglot--p5le-gl6t. p6l-y-syl-l&bic. Pftl-y-hymni-a. It should be remembered that y, except when beginning a word, has the sound of i, and that it never has its name-sound when forming a syllable. Here the first y is unaccented and sounded like obscure i or obscure e, which are hardly distinguishable. pr8ce-dent, noun. pre-cise, pre-cisely, pre-cise-, not-cize. not nor-cize-. pre-clude. See adduce. preda-to-ry. pred-e-cessor, not prede-. pre-di-lection, not pred-i-. preface, nounand verb, not preface. prefect. prefecture--pr8fek-tur, prefek-. prefer-a-ble, not pre-fer-. prefigure--pre-figyur. prelate, not prelate, prelude, noun. Webster alone says prelude, and the later editions of his dictionary permit prelude, pre-lude, verb.
